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Funeral Arrangements at Holy Name Catholic Church

Generally, funeral arrangements at Holy Name are coordinated through the deacon. Please read this information to assist you in making the plans for the funeral arrangements for your loved one.

Rosary Vigil Service

Many Catholic families include in the funeral arrangements for their loved one a Rosary Vigil Service held at the funeral home on an afternoon or evening prior to the funeral. It is often led by a deacon although a family member or friend may lead the recitation of the rosary. When lead by the deacon, this service normally includes Scripture readings, the Rosary, and prayers. You may wish to provide special music (including secular music), present a slide show, and include a eulogy and the sharing of memories. Please discuss the service with the deacon. The Archdiocese of Denver guidelines state that a rosary usually is not recited immediately prior to a funeral Mass, however, there are circumstances where this is possible. If the size of the funeral home is not large enough to accommodate the Vigil Service, the use of the Church may be considered.

Funeral Liturgy

Funeral liturgies may be one of the following:

- A Funeral Mass with the body or cremated remains present. (The Church prefers the body be present.)
- A Memorial Mass with no body or cremains present. (See information about cremains below.)
- A Funeral Service Outside of Mass (either with or without Communion) with the body or cremains present or not, as the situation warrants; this service is usually conducted by the deacon.

We do not have recording or livestreaming capabilities, however you may use your own devices if you desire.

Timing of the funeral is often affected by the availability of the cemetery to handle the committal service, especially if burial is at Fort Logan National Cemetery, and the availability of a priest to celebrate the Mass. Burials at Mount Olivet or other cemeteries located a distance from the Church take place <u>after</u> a reception, if one is held in the St Agnes Center. The deacon usually conducts the Committal Service at the cemetery. The Committal Service may occur on a later date if the cemetery cannot accommodate burial on the date of the funeral or if the body will be cremated after the funeral. The Church emphasizes that cremains should be buried; they should not be scattered, retained at home, divided among family members in memorial containers or jewelry, or mixed with other ashes. The dignity of the person is paramount.

Eulogies provide an opportunity to share memories and express the sentiments of the family as they mourn their loss. Because of the deeply personal and emotional nature of eulogies, we recommend that they be offered at the Rosary Vigil Service or at the Reception, where there will be more time and a better environment for that kind of sharing. However, a eulogy of five minutes by one person may be given prior to the beginning of the funeral Mass (or in some cases at the end of Mass). Please keep in mind that the person delivering the eulogy should have it written out. The eulogy should provide dignified and appropriate information about the deceased; remember, it will be delivered in a sacred environment. Consequently, no off-color or insensitive stories or inappropriate language should be used. Mentioning something about the person's faith-life is most appropriate.

Receptions: The St. Agnes Center may be available for a two-hour reception. If you desire a reception, the reception coordinator will be advised and will contact the family. The "Marthas" group usually prepares and serves at receptions.

• If the deceased was a parishioner, the dependent child of a parishioner, or a former parishioner who moved away due to health or other reasons, there is no charge for the use of the Church or the St. Agnes Center. However, a donation is requested for the "Marthas" to help pay for the food of future receptions. Family members may be asked to help with cleaning up in some cases. Make checks payable to Holy Name Church and include "Marthas" in the note line. Please discuss food arrangement with the coordinator.

- If the deceased was not a parishioner but family members attend Holy Name, there is a charge for the use of the Center which includes coffee service and lemonade. Special catering arrangements must be made; discuss this with the deacon or the coordinator. Families will be asked to assist with the clean-up.
- We do not have the staff to provide receptions for anyone not associated with Holy Name Church.

Music for Funerals at Holy Name Church

All music for a funeral Mass must be appropriate for a liturgical celebration — it should be beautiful, prayerful, and reverent. No secular music may be played during the Mass, (e.g. love songs, movie tunes, etc.) nor may recordings of any kind be used. Holy Name provides the organist and cantor for funeral Masses (for information about stipends, see Fees below), however, in some cases a family member or friend who is a musician and wants to participate in the Mass can be included in the service; discuss this with either the deacon or the music director. Hymns for your selection are listed below. Please select one Entrance Hymn, one Offertory Hymn, one Communion Hymn, and one Closing Hymn. If there is a song you would like that is not on the list, please talk to the music director or deacon. Music is normally provided from the choir loft, except for the Responsorial Psalm.

Scripture Readings for a Funeral

The family is invited to select an **Old Testament**_reading, the **Responsorial Psalm**, and **a New Testament** reading. <u>During the Easter season</u>, instead of an Old Testament reading, a second New Testament reading is used. You may suggest a Gospel reading although the priest or deacon may elect to use a different one. A book with the various common readings is available for review. See the list of some of the frequently used readings below, however, you may request other readings from Scripture. We use the New American Bible version for the Scripture readings (see www.USCCB.org). We encourage you to invite actively practicing Catholics to be readers of the Word if possible. If you have no one who desires to read, we will provide a reader.

Fees: There is no charge for the use of the Church if the deceased was a parishioner of Holy Name. If the deceased was not a parishioner, a donation of \$150 is requested. There is a fee for the organist and/or cantor based on the community rate. It is traditional to provide a stipend to the priest and deacon. Future Mass intentions may be arranged at the office for a stipend of \$10. Sometimes, the funeral home handles these fees. All fees should be paid prior to the funeral Mass. Make checks out to the church or the individual. Place checks or cash in separate envelopes and give to the deacon or the sacristan.
